Green Class Science On Wednesday we finished our topic on 'Healthy Bodies' by building a human being to scale! The children had a key to work with which showed the bones and the organs and they had to piece our life-sized model together as a group. It was like doing a massive jigsaw puzzle. They enjoyed labelling our body and then discussing and comparing the finished result. It was quite funny realising that some of the skeletons wouldn't really work very well because certain bones were missing!

Black History month in the Library

In our library sessions this week, we have been thinking about **Black History Month**, and why it is important that books represent people from different races and backgrounds. The children really thought about it and I was very impressed with their responses.

"They would think everyone in the world didn't have black skin" (Yellow)
